Agency seeks public funds for program growth, expansions

For AFL-CIO Community Services, the main focus of the agency is searching high and low to find the appropriate resource to fit our clients' needs. As an Information and Referral (I&R) service provider, finding resources for clients is our forte. We pride ourselves on knowing where resources can be found and how clients can access them. Those who have volunteered or worked in the service field have experienced first-hand the sense of gratitude one feels when they are able to make a real, positive change in another's life - especially when they need it the most. It's what keeps us coming into the office.

The agency provides a variety of services, many of which are unique to our community and provide assistance not found elsewhere. Our primary program, the Help Me Hotline, is utilized by both social service providers and those needing assistance, making it essential to our community. The Help Me Hotline provides I&R service to all of Northwest Missouri and Northeast Kansas.

Through this service, anyone needing assistance can call to get accurate, up-to-date information on all available area resources for assistance. It saves time and resources for both those needing assistance and coordinating agencies because it eliminates fruitless searches and conserves area agency resources.

Soles for Christ preps for 2022

AFL-CIO Community Services is planning the 2022 Soles for Christ shoe distribution. The agency is hopeful this year's distribution will again be held at the St. Joseph Civic Arena, 100 N 4th St., as it provides a more participant-friendly environment by allowing recipients to remain indoors and out of the summer heat.

The event will be returning to its two-day format, with tentative dates for the distribution set for

Tuesday, August 2nd, and Wednesday, August 3rd.

This will be the 20th year for the perpetual program, which offers shoes to children from pre-school to 12th grade

living in Andrew and Buchanan counties in MO, as well as Doniphan County, KS. New this year will be the addition of DeKalb and Clinton counties to the list.

For the majority of the agency's programming, we are very fortunate that finding the resources to keep programs afloat is not too arduous. Those who choose to support many of our programs, like Soles for Christ and Adopt-A-Family, do so whole-heartedly. They are generous in their time, donations and financial support. We are very aware of how fortunate this is for our agency and the individuals it helps.

Ironically, the same programs that provide year-round assistance and make the largest impact in our community are the hardest to garner support for; the I&R program that has made it possible for us to search out resources for others, has very little luck with garnering resources of its own.

Most funders, including both federal and private grants, prefer to fund "direct" sources of support, or those programs that actually provide the service. While the Help Me Hotline IS providing a service - the referral - is not seen as a tangible resource.

Because AFL-CIO Community Services is not an affiliate of a national organization, it relies heavily on local funding to support the eight programs it administers.

Without local support, the agency could not continue to provide services for our community members who need it. In addition to the Help Me Hotline, Community Services administers five perpetual programs and two annual programs. Year-long programs include: Fab-U-Less Finds thrift store, Lions Club eyeglasses, Diaper Depot, Seasonal Services, and Emergency Assistance. Annual programs are Adopt-A-Family Christmas and Soles for Christ.

new tennis shoes, monetary donations or by volunteering during the distribution days.

NEW shoes can be donated at the agency, 1203 N. 6th St., until Friday, July 29th. Hours for drop off are 8 am – 5 pm, Monday through Friday. Monetary donations are also welcome, and all donations are tax deductible.

Volunteers for the program would help size and fit children with their shoes, keep stock organized or help with family registration.

❖ Callers are provided resources for basic needs including food, shelter, healthcare, mental health, employment, education and seasonal assistance (tax preparation, school supplies, heating/cooling centers).

❖ Callers reach a trained, caring Call Specialist who assesses the needs of each person and searches a database with more than 8,000 services to connect callers with the help they need.

❖ In 2021, the agency had 21,620 contacts, made 6,461 referrals, and advocated on behalf of 2,579 clients.

❖ Of the 724 families that applied during the 2021 program, 273 households had \$0 income.

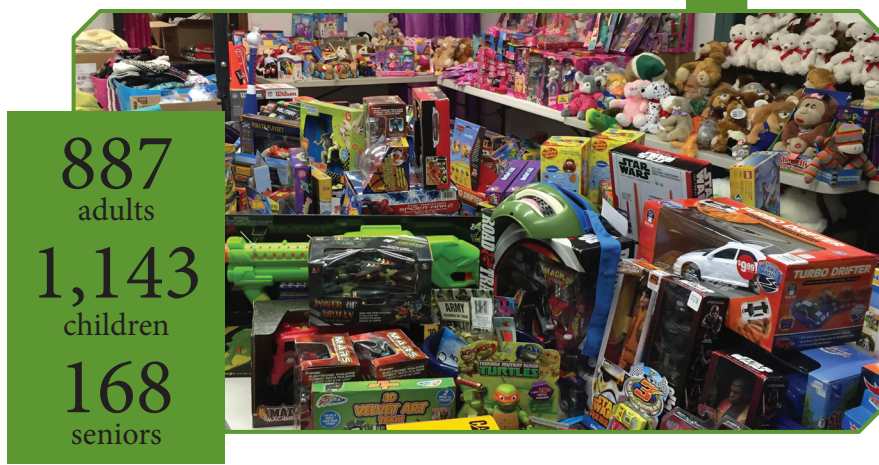
❖ The majority, 89 percent (647 families), are at 100 percent or below poverty guidelines; 8 percent (55 families) are up to 35 percent above poverty guidelines; and 3 percent (22 families) are 36 percent or more above poverty guidelines.

❖ In 2021, 730 different adopters provided assistance to the families. This included, 124 individuals/families; and 63 businesses/organizations. There were 510 undesignated monetary donations made to the program to help cover the cost of food baskets, gift cards and vouchers for families.

❖ Heart Warmers is a partnership for the agency. Created by R.J. Jackson, the program provides space heaters to those in need during the cold weather months.

❖ To combat summer heat, fans are donated by Everygy and air conditioners are donated by the public.

❖ In 2021, 57 heaters, 39 fans and 3 air conditioners were given to 86 households, which included 242 individuals.

❖ The four most common funding needs of 2021 were: gasoline/automotive, sewer bills, medical expenses/prescriptions and water bills.

❖ There are no boundaries, no eligibility guidelines and no fees for this service.

❖ The agency uses emergency funds for the people that "fall through the cracks" like car payments, insurance, and repairs, phone bills, medical needs and other necessities required to exist. The agency tries to fill those gaps.

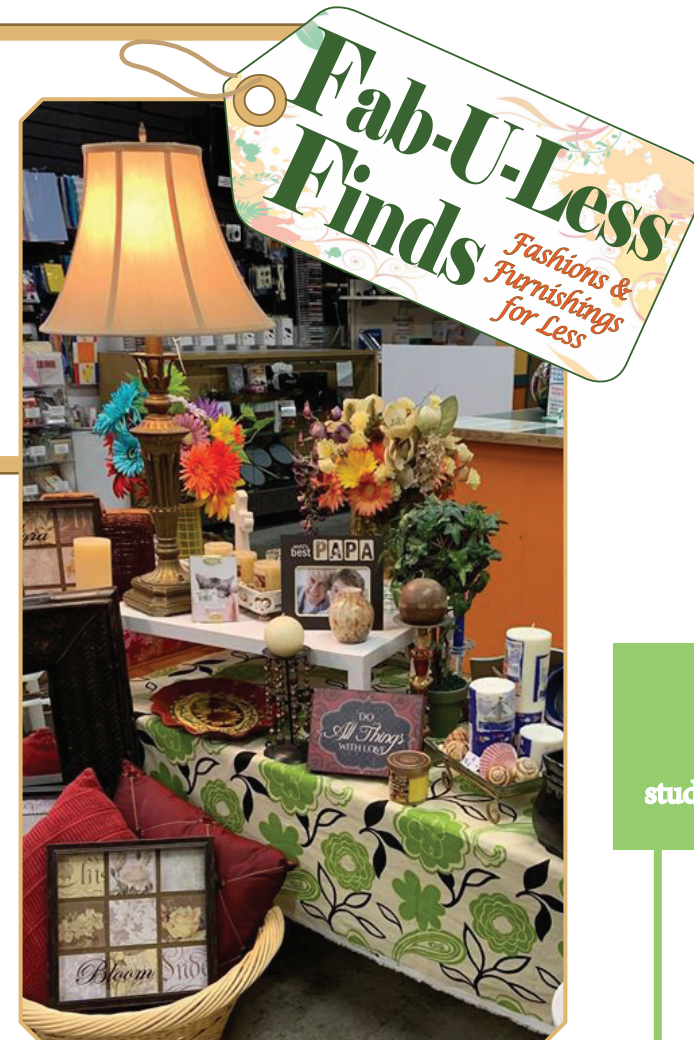

❖ The Fab-U-Less Finds voucher program allows each household to receive six free items per person within the household, four times a year.

❖ The store is open to the public and relies on donations for its inventory; the store offers pick ups for those donors who cannot deliver.

❖ The voucher program served 2,016 people in 2021, providing 10,441 free items, including clothes, household, furniture and medical supplies.



❖ In 2021, 56 individuals applied for glasses, with 31 receiving a pair.

❖ Nearly 2,560 people have been provided with a pair of glasses critical for work, injury avoidance and optic health.

❖ This program is a group effort: Family Guidance provides funding for eye exams; local optometrists provide the exams and fit clients for glasses; the three local Lions Clubs fund it as a group; and Community Services administers the program.

❖ Children in pre-k through 12th grade, living in Buchanan and Andrew counties in Missouri and Doniphan County in Kansas, are eligible to receive a free pair of new tennis shoes.

❖ Beginning in 2022, children living in DeKalb and Clinton counties will be eligible for the program.



❖ Every qualified child who comes to the distribution receives shoes.

❖ The first year, 210 pairs of school shoes were distributed.

❖ In 2021, the program utilized 153 volunteers performing 731 hours of service.



1 GOAL: Expand Soles for Christ shoe program into DeKalb and Clinton counties for the 2022 program. Give at least 1,500 pairs of new tennis shoes to students.

VALUE: \$25 per pair of shoes

FUNDS NEEDED:
\$37,500

2 GOAL: Expand the Diaper Depot program into a supplementary, rather than emergency, program; serve at least 400 children with up to 50 percent of monthly diapers.

VALUE: Approximately \$50 per child

FUNDS NEEDED: \$20,000

3 GOAL: Provide Christmas gifts to 750 families through the Adopt-A-Family Christmas program.

VALUE: Approximately \$75 per person, based on a yearly average of 2,500 individuals.

FUNDS NEEDED: \$187,500

4 GOAL: Process at least 2,400 individuals through the Fab-U-Less Finds Voucher program; giving each person six free items.

VALUE: Average \$2.25 per item

\$30,000
